7.1 Awards: Second para. should read "With respect to the SSIT award for 'Outstanding Service", a REVISION has been REPORTED to the Constitution and ByLaws Committee (Lawrence) to INCORPORATE IN THE BYLAWS A CRITERION to include all types of Public Service, not just 'whistle blowing.' Third para. Replace 'Barus was asked..' with 'A motion was passed 6 to 1 with 1 abstention that Barus should prepare ...'

4.0 President's Report

New Division Reps. for 1988 were announced. See attached sheet for these and all other officials.

The President reported having introduced the following motion which passed unanimously at the last TAB meeting:
"TAB requests that the BOD modify the Bylaw and/or Constitution such that future proposed changes to the Code of Ethics be first formally reviewed by cognizant bodies such as the Member Conduct Comm, USAB Ethics Comm., and the TAB Div VI societies before being proposed to the membership for change; .and that the BOD proposals for change be published in The Institute for member comment at least three months before final adoption."

Robbi told us of a sadly moving report given by one of the engineers who went to the Africon meeting in the Ivory Coast. We are all generally aware of the poverty in the Third World countries, but it somehow hits home more starkly when one hears that the average income of a college professor is less than \$2,000 and that the most recent Jouranls are about vintage 1979. For details read Emerson Pugh's column in the March '88 issue of The Institute.

Spectrum is planning a special Engineering Hostory issues which will, among other things, chronicle the work of well and little known people and engineering organizations whose work has had a real impact on the world. He suggested we think of those in the T&S field who should be written of.

5.0 Past President's Report

A report was made on the deliberations and conclusions of a meeting of the USAB Ethics Comm. concerning the recent changes made in the IEEE Ethics Code by the BOD. The very competent and fair way in which the Ethics Comm. Chairman Bob McClure conducted the meeting and summarized the results was commented on.

6.0 Treasurer's Report

In the absence of the Treasurer, the President gave the report. Headquarters reported a unique computer error had caused our Budget to look far worse than it should have. This will be corrected (sic). No figures are yet available to allow a clear picture of our present financial status. Latest figures are about one year old.

A motion was made that the T & S Journal non-member subscription rate be set at \$43/yr starting in '89. Motion passed unanimously.

There was discussion of how to incorporate non-member interest in the T & S Journal.

6.5 Other Society Liaison

Bianculli checked with the Pres. of the ASME T & S Div. regarding co-sponsorship of the Linder Award. They were not able to move ahead on it, but are considering other areas of cooperation.

Unger, Kline, and Rossoff formed an ad hoc committee to draft a Position Paper for SSIT on Support of Ethical Behavior of Engineers.

7.1 Awards:

Barus moved and Unger seconded a motion to give a posthumous award to Benjamin Linder. The supporting documents including the draft Citation appear as attachments to the 12/19/87 minutes. The motion passed 8 to 1. Barus will contact Linder's parents.

Barus moved and Benjamin seconded the following addition to the SSIT Bylaws to be added after 9.2 IEEE/SSIT AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING SERVICE IN THE PUBLIC INTEREST.

"9.3 The Award of Section 9.2 is conferred on occasion by SSIT upon an engineer or technical person in recognition of courageous action to promote the public health, safety, or welfare despite risk to professional career. The recipient need not be a member of IEEE, but the action recognized must be within the scope of IEEE's interest and in the spirit of the IEEE Code of Ethics.

In considering a potential nominee for the Award, the Committee shall take into account the significance to the public interest of the candidate's action and the extent of personal risk involved. The Committee shall submit its nominations to the Outcome for final action."

Bob Brook will determine the next step in the amendment procedure.

7.2 T&S Magazine: Rabow reported the Sept.'87 and Dec.'87 issues have gone out. Mar. '88 is imminent! Jun is a Special Issue on Patents which is half full so far. Bronzino is going to edit a Special issue on Ethics in Bioengineering.

Rabow will determine how to get our 'Magazine' reclassified as a 'Transactions' for the purpose of publications costing. If this cAn be done it will reduce our editing costs by an estimated 15 - 20%. This is following the helpful suggestion of an IEEE Division Director.

7.3 Conferences:

A repeat of last year's Retreat at Fellowship Farm is being planned for the July 4th weekend.

The Carnahan Conference will also take place this year at the U. of KY in Lexington in Sept. or Gct. Benjamin will try to get the date established in time to get an announcement in our Jun T&S.*

7.4 Membership:

In Jatlow's absence Robbi reported that there has been a net membership gain in the past year of about 14. Though there has also been a slight attrition in regular membership, the increase in student members has been more than the net of 14. Present active paying members is about 2400.

We have been given a grant of \$1,000 by the IEEE Membership Development Comm. to produce a brochure It is presently being drafted. Will be reviewed by Barus. ACTION: JATLOW

Unger reported that the Civil Service Reform Act which has been in operation for about 9 years has a section on 'Whistle Blowers' which has been used by the administrating agency to defend the company rather than the individual in over 1000 cases, with only 4 exceptions. As a result a new Act, HR25 Government Accounting Protection (GAP) has been introduced to correct the misuse of the original Act. Unger received support from SSIT to give our endorsement to HR25 in a way that will be appropriate.


